
India stands today as a bulwark of democracy and stability. Just over seven decades ago, we took our first steps in charting a sovereign future based on values and ideals inherited from our ancient civilization and guided by the key principles of truth and nonviolence that defined our Independence movement.

Ties between India and Japan are cemented by close bonds forged on the anvil of Buddhism. Our bilateral relationship is founded on shared values of democracy, respect for rule of law and an abiding commitment to peace. We have a growing convergence on strategic and economic issues. We support an Indo-Pacific architecture that is free, open and inclusive.

Under the dynamic leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, India's economy has been growing at over 7 percent. Today, India is the world's fastest-growing large economy. It is emerging as a global hub for manufacturing and innovation. With the introduction of Goods and Services Tax, we are optimistic that growth figures will reach 8 percent or more in the near future. The Indian economy offers unparalleled opportunities to Japanese companies to participate in flagship programmes such as Make in India, Skill India, Smart Cities and Industrial Townships and Corridors.

India is Japan's largest official development assistance (ODA) partner and Japan is the third-largest investor in India. The Japan Bank for International Cooperation's JBIC Surveys in recent years have consistently ranked India as the most preferred medium-term destination for Japanese manufacturing companies. India has one of the most liberal foreign direct investment (FDI) regimes in the world and has registered FDI inflows of nearly \$62 billion in fiscal 2017-18. Japanese investments to India totaled \$4.7 billion in fiscal 2016-17. The Mumbai-Ahmedabad High Speed Railway project is a symbol of our thriving and mutually beneficial partnership.

Japan's economic footprint in India has expanded beyond the manufacturing sector to include the services sector, logistics and financial markets. New initiatives cover healthcare, agriculture, food processing and a digital partnership. In 2017, the Startup and Innovation sector received further impetus with our two prime ministers directing that we work closely to establish an "India-Japan Start-

up Hub." Recently, during the visit of Economy, Trade and Industry Minister Hiroshige Seko to India on May 1, 2018, a joint statement on launching a Japan-India Startup Initiative was signed, covering the establishment of the first "Japan-India Startup Hub" in Bengaluru. In the same month, we also established the Japan India Food Business Council, with about 95 Japanese companies as members, to facilitate investments and joint ventures in the promising food-processing sector in India.

A growing number of Japanese

A growing number of Japanese companies are participating in skill transfer initiatives such as the establishment of Japan-India Institutes of Manufacturing (JIM) in India, which aims to enhance the manufacturing base in India by training 30,000 people over the

next 10 years in Japanese style manufacturing skills and practices. In 2017, the first five JIMs were established by Suzuki, Toyota, Daikin, Yamaha and Hitachi. Toyota Tsusho is likely to establish its JIM in 2018 and more Japanese companies are expected to join the program soon. On a parallel track, India has initiated the dispatch of interns to Japan under the Technical Interns Training Programme (TITP). In a truly historic development, the first batch of technical interns from India arrived in Japan under the framework of TITP in July 2018. India also attaches great importance to promoting Japanese-language education in India. The availability of well-trained human resources equipped with Japanese

language and manufacturing skills would further facilitate the entry of Japanese companies in India.

Cooperation in clean energy remains a priority. India and Japan have successfully concluded an Agreement for Cooperation in the Peaceful Uses of Nuclear Energy. Our cooperation in science and technology, space and marine sciences is growing, especially through institutional linkages between universities and the Indian Institutes of Technology and laboratories of the Council for Scientific & Industrial Research in India with counterparts in Japan.

In a world of growing challenges and opportunities, the relationship between our two countries is a key factor in promoting stability in the Indo-Pacific and fostering a peaceful and multipolar world buttressed by increased connectivity and an inclusive, open and balanced regional architecture. India and Japan have also agreed to work together on connectivity and capacity-building projects in other countries. The "Act East Policy" of India complements the "Enhanced Partnership for Quality Infrastructure of Japan, "as reflected in the working of our bilateral Act


East Forum.
Dialogue and exchanges between the Ministries of Defense and all three defense services have enhanced friendship and mutual understanding. The recently concluded trilateral Malabar exercise between India, Japan and the United States held off Guam is a significant event in our maritime cooperation.

The visit of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Japan in November 2016 and the visit of Prime Minister Shinzo Abe to India in September 2017 were major landmarks. Following the successful visit of the External Affairs Minister of India Sushma Swaraj to Japan for the ninth Strategic Dialogue in March this year, we are now looking forward to the forthcoming visit of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Japan for the next annual summit meeting.

India's ties with Japan in recent years have received a fillip due to the efforts of all stakeholders ranging from parliamentarians to captains of industry and leaders of states in India and prefectures in Japan. People-to-people contacts, including tourism, are steadily riscluding tourism. Both India and Japan Friendly Exchanges in Culture and Tourism. Both India and Japan have agreed to double the two-way tourist traffic to 700,000 by 2020. The popularity of Indian cuisine and culture is widespread throughout Japan. It was remarkable that the International Day of Yoga was celebrated in diverse places in Japan in June this year, including for the first time in Japan's Diet.

It has been a privilege and an honor to represent India in Japan at a time of such great progress in bilateral ties. With our shared democratic values, we seek to work together with the government and the people of Japan to take our partnership to new heights in the 21st centu-


consolidating national strength

Especially, small and medium-sized enterprises should be encouraged by private and public sector initia-

The Japanese government and pro-India Japanese people in the private sector aided in the estabishment of the Indian National Army and the Indian Independence League. Rash Bihari Bose called Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, then in Germany, to come to Asia to succeed him Chandra Bose, with the help of the Japanese government and well-wishers including the JIA, took the reins of the INA and the league to continue the fight against the British colonizers during World War II.

After India gained independence in 1947, India extended friendship and helped Japan reenter the international community. With the end of the Cold War in 1989 and the subsequent change in India's foreign policy, the Japan-India relationship gained great momentum. I made a visit to India in 2000, the first by an incumbent prime minister since 1990, and launched the Japan-India Global Partnership with then Indian Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee. This part-nership has eventually been upgraded to the Special, Strategic and Global Partnership of today.

Our cooperation today is seeing unprecedented expansion thanks to the heightened efforts of the governments and peoples of both countries. Prime ministers Shinzo Abe and Narendra Modi, with their shared vision and friendship, are combining the Indo-Pacific strategy of Japan and the Act East policy of India to promote peace and prosperity in our

region and beyond.
Our bilateral relationship is also growing in trade and investment. Mega-projects in India are multiplying, including a Shinkansen project between Mumbai and Ahmedabad. Japanese investment has gained momentum owing to the reform of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) and other deregulatory steps by the Indian government, and the joint promotion of industrial parks and infrastructure-building in various regions of India. People-to-people contacts are mushrooming in such areas as cultural exchanges, scholarships, youth exchange programs, internships, tourism promotion and initiatives by local governments to establish direct



History of Independence Day

India's first struggle against British rule started as early as 1857 58. At the time, Indian people staged a small revolt but were immediately put down. The freedom fighters nominated as their "com mander-in-chief" Bahadur Shah II, the last of the Mughal emperors who had ruled India for more than three centuries. Angered by the mutiny, Britain sent the emperor into exile in Rangoon, now Yangon, where he was killed.

When Britain began preparations for the outbreak of World War I, about 1.3 million Indian people were sent to the United Kingdom and many foreign lands, fighting and dying without gaining recog

In 1919, the Indian Act was adopted in the British Parliament to institute a responsible govern-

ment in India with Indian citizens and Indian government officials given more rights and autonomous authority. However, this backfired and ignited resistance among Indian people as the British

government tried to quash this act. Around that time a new star was born. His name was Mohandas Karmachand Gandhi. He created a new way to challenge British rule, known as Gandhi's Way, acting for freedom and rights without using violence. His strategy was demonstrated in the historic Salt March to protest the salt tax.

Following many small rebellions, in 1947 Britain finally withdrew from India, ending colonial rule. On midnight on Aug. 15, 1947, India became an independent country.

Reflecting on our history also helps put things into perspective regarding the future for all Indians all over the world, especially those
